About Speaker: As a Middle School English Language Arts Teacher at High Plains School in Loveland, Janelle had a big idea to get her kids doing philanthropy instead of just learning about it. It started with a spark of an idea from her use of Project Heart, and after a few years, it became a school-wide day of service. As the project grew over time, so did Janelle's use of Project Heart. She began with microlearnings, using them for discussion and writing prompts. She then started using the first few lessons, finding great value in students crafting their own mission statements connected to personal passions and their 3Ts. While Janelle is now retired from

teaching, she continues to support Project Heart and its value for educators and students.

Why Project Heart? An Administrator's Perspective



Speaker: Alissa Poduska, Principal at Bamford Elementary

About Speaker: In 2003, Alissa began her teaching career, opening Bacon Elementary as a 3rd-grade teacher. She held several roles at the school including Assistant Principal, before becoming the Principal of Shepardson STEM Elementary in 2015. She brought Problem-Based Learning (PBL) to the school and established community partnerships to provide ongoing PBL opportunities for students. In early 2020, Alissa was offered her dream opportunity of opening the newest elementary school in Fort Collins, Bamford Elementary. With the support of

her leadership team and the goal of creating a positive impact for students and the community, Alissa partnered with OtterCares Foundation and MindSpark Learning to establish Bamford Elementary as the very first Project Heart School.

Session Description: With so many competing priorities in education, it might feel difficult to make time for something like Project Heart. Learn from an administrator's perspective why Project Heart is so impactful on students and how it can add value to your school community in a way that fills gaps and solves existing challenges.

Who They Are:

Bamford Elementary, Poudre School District's newest elementary school, serves students in PK-5th grade and opened its doors in August 2021. Taking input from architects, district leaders and classroom teachers, the building itself was designed to intentionally foster collaboration between staff, students, families, and the community. Bamford Elementary's Purpose Statement is "Together, we inspire and empower the minds of today to make a difference in our world tomorrow." They promise to:

- Create an environment where everyone knows they belong, are accepted, and loved.
- Value, model and foster kindness and empathy
- Be a place where students can be curious and take risks as we search for solutions.
- Maintain high expectations while fostering independence, allowing students to take ownership and lead their learning.

How They Use Project Heart:

Using a problem-based learning (PBL) model, Bamford Elementary encourages students to learn by solving real-world challenges. A robust network of community partners from business, nonprofit and local government support the school by sharing challenges for students to tackle. At the end of each PBL unit, students present their ideas to a panel of community partners for feedback, input and sometimes even implementation. Bamford is incorporating giving back into their PBL model through a pilot program with OtterCares to become the first Project Heart School.

Lopez Elementary School

Who They Are:

Lopez Elementary School is Northern Colorado's first Leader in Me school and earned Lighthouse recognition in Spring 2014. Their building is a PK-5 facility that serves approximately 400 students and is a neighborhood school of choice. Lopez was again named as a recipient of the Colorado Governor's Distinguished Improvement award for 2013. Their school is committed to developing and delivering a well-rounded educational program for all its students using the Leader in Me model. Lopez believes this includes rigorous academics, varied co-curricular programs, and an effective partnership between home and school.

How They Use Project Heart:

Every February, fourth graders at Lopez Elementary open a pop-up restaurant in our school commons to raise funds to send children with special needs to summer camp. The Lopez Loves Respite Care Benefit Luncheon develops students' individual and collective leadership by involving students directly in each step of the process from researching Respite Care, to soliciting donations, inviting guests, setting-up and staffing the restaurant, and reflecting on and presenting about the project's impact. Mission driven and student directed service is a key aspect of Lopez's "Leader in Me" model, and this project has been integrated with Project Heart for well over a decade. Through this experience we seek to develop children's vision and individual talents, as well as their confidence in the power of community to create positive change in our world.

The Gardens on Spring Creek

Who They Are:

The Gardens on Spring Creek is the community botanic garden of Fort Collins, Colorado. Our 18-acre site opened in 2004 as part of an important partnership between the City of Fort Collins and the Friends of the Gardens on Spring Creek. The Gardens is City of Fort Collins Facility. Following a two-year, \$6 million expansion project, The Gardens offers an expanded Visitor's Center and gift shop, Butterfly House, Everitt Pavilion and Great Lawn, along with five acres of new gardens to explore.

How They Use Project Heart

Project Hort, short for horticulture, is a full summer stewardship and volunteer program for teens entering sixth through 12th grade who are passionate about gardening, plants, animals or the environment. We molded the Project Heart curriculum to fit in an informal, summer, gardenbased learning environment. Teens learn about philanthropy through designing their own conservation projects, first job skills through volunteering and build lifelong relationships with the support of our Teen mentor.

Liberty Common High School

Who They Are:



Liberty Common High School is a public, tuition-free, college-preparatory, charter high school. We are chartered by the Poudre School District (PSD). LCHS delivers a classical, liberal-arts curriculum accentuating math, science and engineering. Liberty consistently achieves the highest statewide standardized test scores in northern Colorado.

How They Use Project Heart:

How can Project Heart ideas be applied in STEM or STEAM education? Philanthropy concepts from Project Heart were used as a starting point to launch a "Projects with a Purpose" unit in our high school Introduction to Engineering course. Students received instruction in computer-aided design, 3D printing, and the engineering design process at the beginning of the semester. Once the students had learned the technical basics, they were asked to use their time, talents, and treasure to complete a small but meaningful design project that makes a difference in the lives of others. In this presentation, I will share some of the project results from our students and describe some of the lessons that we learned as educators applying philanthropy in an engineering class. Although we worked primarily with 10th-grade students, the "Projects with a Purpose" idea could also be adapted and applied to grades 5-12 if desired.

Who They Are:

High Plains is an Early Childhood through eighth grade STEAM school fueled by innovative and authentic learning opportunities where all members feel safe, valued, and empowered. Students are immersed in the inquiry process while taking risks and engaging in issues facing our community in order to have a positive impact on our world today, tomorrow, and in years to come.

How They Use Project Heart:

The Middle School Day of Service at High Plains is a day where the middle school students and staff go out into the community and partner with local nonprofit organizations. These organizations provide students with opportunities to help with a variety of tasks. A few examples include cleaning and maintaining a local park trail, packing food, performing at nursing homes, and building Little Free Libraries. Leading up to Day of Service, students worked through various lessons of the Project Heart program, learning about 3Ts, writing their own mission statements, and researching various nonprofits. The project helped students develop a deep sense of empathy and compassion for others, while also giving them the impact to make a positive difference in the community.

Who They Are:

Truscott Elementary is a dual language emersion school in the Thompson School District.



How They Used Project Heart:

Truscott Elementary in Loveland, Colorado is a dual language immersion school that hosts a Multicultural Festival at the end of the school year. Third grade teacher, Julia Halualani, saw this event as an end-in-mind for her students to shine through a self-directed project.

Julia adapted the upper elementary lessons and incorporated some elements from the clubs version of Project Heart to take a problem-based learning approach to a service learning project. She taught what it means to be a philanthropist while meeting literacy and research standards. She enhanced Project Heart lessons by adding in Google Forms for student engagement through voting. Communication and collaboration skills were also a focal point when it came to persuading classmates to get on board with causes they were passionate about. The cherry on top was collaboration with a local library, the art teacher and community as a whole, and of course when her students were awarded money from their grant application.

Through Project Heart, students executed their fundraising project for The Wild Animal Sanctuary during the school's annual Multicultural Event! They used their persuasive speaking and then gave away 3D printed objects in return for donations for their cause.

Olander Elementary School

Who They Are:

Our classrooms offer a comprehensive K-5 curriculum based on the Colorado Academic Standards. We focus our lesson development on best practices to promote high levels of academic growth, achievement and engagement. Each grade level has three project-based learning (PBL) units they complete throughout the school year. When students are working on a project, they occur during a specific time of day dedicated for project-based learning. We utilize this approach to deepen conceptual learning and to enhance the 21st century skills students learn throughout the school day.

In the fall of 2009, Olander Elementary officially became Olander School for Project Based Learning! The roots of PBL lie in the long-standing education philosophy that students learn best through experiential, hands-on, and student directed learning experiences. Utilization of PBL has exploded over the last ten years for many reasons. One reason is that the current research indicates that students need to construct knowledge through engaging and rich learning experiences. Another reason is that educators are becoming increasingly aware that high school graduates will be entering a global economy in which both knowledge and integrated skills are required to succeed. In other words, students will need to be able to plan, collaborate, think critically, solve problems, and communicate effectively to be successful. These 21st Century Skills are central to project-based learning and reflect the world in which children now live.

How They Use Project Heart:

Fourth grade students were introduced to nonprofit organizations from ColoradoGives.org to identify (or confirm) what they are passionate about. Through research and communication with organizations, students prioritized what each nonprofit needed and planned how to address the groups' needs using their time, talent, and treasures. To give back to Animal Friends Alliance, Children's Hospital, and W.O.L.F. Sanctuary, students wrote grants, organized cookie dough sales, coin and donation drives, and assembled a variety of items. Students had remarkable reflections on how this project personally touched them.



How They Use Project Heart:

For the 2022-23 school year, Erin Gilmore offered a class titled "Project Heart" at PSD Options. This class was specifically for 3rd-6th grade students in the Options program who had an interest in learning about philanthropy. The class met for one hour per week on Fridays and utilized the first eight lessons of the elementary Project Heart program. They brought in guest speakers to highlight various examples of personal philanthropy and then interviewed nonprofits to learn about their work. At the end of the lessons, students voted on two organizations that were meaningful for them as a group and executed two impact projects to support those organizations.

Who They Are:

AlphaBEST Education has been providing before and after school programs since 2005. We currently serve approximately 30,000 students in 16 states. Family is important to us. We are a family-owned business, and we take pride in the relationships we build with students, their parents, district staff, our staff, and the local communities that we become part of.

How They Use Project Heart:

AlphaBEST offered the Clubs Version of Project Heart as an optional enrichment opportunity to its sites during the Spring 2023 semester. Each Site Director utilized content from Project Heart to teach students about philanthropy and giving back. Students then brainstormed nonprofits they wanted to impact and projects they wanted to execute. Sites had different projects such as writing letters to senior citizens, an art contest, pickle sales, a clothing drive, and a carnival. These projects impacted numerous Northern Colorado nonprofits and AlphaBEST plans to implement Project Heart again for the 2023-24 school year at all of their Northern Colorado sties.

Girl Scouts of Colorado



Who They Are:

Girl Scouts create the world they want to live in and strive to make it better every single day. They explore their strengths, take on new challenges, and can always be themselves, regardless of background or ability. Supported by adult volunteers and mentors right here in our community, as well as millions of alums around the globe, Girl Scouts lead the way as they discover who they are and how they can make the future a brighter place.

How They Use Project Heart:

The OtterCares Foundation partnered with Girl Scouts of Colorado in the winter of 2021 to create a Project Heart Patch Program. This program provides troop leaders with tools and resources to help Girl Scouts experience philanthropy and volunteerism by creating unique service projects that each Scout must participate in to be eligible to receive the Project Heart Patch. Since the Project Heart Patch Program launched in December of 2022, over 400 3rd-5th grade Girl Scouts in Northern Colorado have earned their Project Heart Patch. One participant shared, "[I] learned there are many different things you can do to help people. It doesn't always have to be food, shelter and clothing. You can use music, acting or humor to make people feel better or have a night of performance to raise money for people in need."

Shepardson STEM Elementary School's STAR Squad

Who They Are:

STAR Squad Student Leaders is the student leadership organization at Shepardson STEM Elementary. The STAR Squad serves as role models for their peers and participates in a variety of tasks to make our school stronger. STAR Squad is offered to students in Third through Fifth grade. Students are selected through an application process. STAR Squad meets monthly, and members participate in activities such as being greeters at Family STEM Night, leading tours for dignitary visits, planning school spirit days, service projects, and other activities that bring our school community together.

How They Used Project Heart:

Each year Becky Woodcox, STEM Elementary PBL and STEM Coordinator at Shepardson Elementary, leads 30-40 amazing third through fifth grade students to "...work together to find ways to serve our school, our community, to be examples of good, and to learn leadership skills." During COVID, Becky wanted to keep students engaged in STAR Squad, even if it meant moving the club to a virtual setting. Becky realized that the virtual setting gave her a unique opportunity to integrate Project Heart into the work the club was already doing. Working with Sarah Weeks, the Impact and Education Director for OtterCares, Becky drew on the school's already established PBL model and focus on design thinking to develop a modified version of Project Heart that would work for STAR Squad in a virtual setting.


