



## **Lesson 6:** What is the End Goal for Positive Impact?



### **Learning Target**

Create an end goal for the class project(s) that will make an impact on the local, national, or global level.



20-30 Minutes

## **Lesson Overview and Teacher Prep**



- Warm-Up (5 min): picture prompt to begin brainstorming process of how both the giver and receiver can be effected by philanthropy.
- · Activity (10 min): class vote on project and small group work to create end goals for class project.
- Reflection for Action (5 min): class vote on end goals and pair-share personal end goals from project.
- Materials used as needed: L6W1, PowerPoint MS Lesson 6 PP, six pieces of paper and six laptops, iPads
  or other electronic devices with Wi-Fi (one per small group) cue the needed sites prior to class.
- Standards from Common Core, National Council for Social Studies (NCSS), and National Standards for Economics.

# Lesson 6: What is the End Goal for Positive Impact?

Warm-Up: Where Will You Make a Difference? (Picture prompt for quick-write activity - 5 minutes)



PowerPoint Slide 1 – picture of hospital patient, use to prompt writing related to giving.



- Ask students to write on the Warmup portion of their worksheet L6W1 about how hospital patients can be on the giving and receiving ends of philanthropy.
- After about three minutes, ask students to raise their hand if they have ever been in a hospital as a patient or visiting someone they care about.
- Explain that some people find ways to give to others even when they share the same difficult circumstances as the people they are focusing their philanthropic effort on.
- Call on 2-3 students to share their worksheet responses.
   [TEACHER TIP] Use this warm-up to discuss the difference that an individual can make.

Activity: Setting Goals for our Project (Class vote, small group discussions to set class project goals – 10-20 minutes)

- Divide the class into six groups and ask each group to find 2-3 project ideas from one of these sources (it would be best to have these sites cued on laptops, iPads or other electronic devices):

- After about seven minutes, ask each group to share a project idea that they found from their research.
- Using the class project ideas from Lesson 5 and today's project ideas from research, ask the class or each group/individual to decide on their favorite projects.
  - [NOTE TO TEACHER] You can choose to do one class project, several group projects, or multiple individual projects depending on student interests and capability.



 As a class, discuss the projects then ask students to write this class project in the Activity portion of their worksheet L6W1.



PowerPoint Slide 2 – prompt students to write end goals for the class project(s)

[TEACHER TIP] Use this activity to explore differences that individuals and small groups can make.

**<u>Reflection for Action</u>** (Class vote on end goals for class project - 5 minutes)

Brainstorm important end goals for the project(s) with the class and write 5-7 of these goals on the board. Next, take a vote (1 end goal for whole group project, no more than 3 end goals for small group/individual projects).



PowerPoint Slide 3 – prompt students to write their personal goals for the class project.

- Ask students to write personal and project end goals in the Reflection for Action portion of their worksheet L6W1.
- Allow 1-2 minutes for students to share their personal end goals with a partner.
